# Men's Lacrosse

Eighteen underclassmen dotted a 30-player roster in 2009 during Brian Endicott's first year as head coach. The young Lyons overcame their collective lack of experience to go 6–1 in the Pilgrim League and advance to the conference tournament title game for the second straight season, a first in program history. Wheaton dropped a close 12–7 decision in the championship tilt, falling to perennial power Springfield College. The Lyons finished 8–8 overall, buoyed by a school-record-tying seven-game winning streak, while advancing to the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Tournament semifinals. With only four players lost to graduation, the Blue and White looks to remain in contention for its initial league tournament crown and NCAA Tournament bid.

Jeff Gomer '09 and Ben Cederberg '11 each drew their second Pilgrim League All-Conference honor, while long-stick midfielder Cody Powers '11 was a first-time selection. Gomer won 103 face-offs and scored 18 goals last year, graduating first in program history in career ground balls and second in draw victories. Cederberg notched 28 goals and 26 assists, as his 54 points were the most by a Wheaton underclassman since 1997. With 31 goals, Billy McNamara '12 posted the most by a Blue and White freshman since 1994, while keeper Schuyler Horn '10 notched an 8–6 record and a 9.41 GAA.

**Brian Endicott**

Brian Endicott begins his second full year at the helm of the men's lacrosse program after a successful debut season in 2009. Endicott was an as-

sistant coach for Wheaton in spring 2007 and the interim head coach the following fall.

In 2009, Endicott's charges tied a school mark with seven

straight wins en route to an 8–8 record, including 6–1 in the Pilgrim League. The Lyons qualified for the conference tournament championship game for the second straight season for the first time in program history and eventually advanced to the semifinals during the ECAC Tournament.

Endicott spent the spring of 2008 as an assistant coach at Endicott College, where he helped lead the nationally ranked Gulls to a program-record 18 wins and their first ECAC Tournament championship. In 2007, Wheaton just missed qualifying for the

Pilgrim League Tournament, as its 4–4 mark and tie for fifth in the regular-season standings left the Lyons short of a tournament bid.

Endicott brings ample high school and camp coaching experience to Wheaton, having served on the staff of the Rising Star Boys' Lacrosse Camp at the college in summer 2008. During the 2005 and 2006 seasons, he was a coach in the boys' program at his alma mater, Malden Catholic High School.

Endicott was an instructor at Springfield College for the Peak 200 camp in 2004 and Peak Performance camp in

2001, while also gaining experience at the 2002 U.S. Naval Academy camp in Annapolis, Maryland.

A former three-year player at Springfield, Endicott tallied 39 goals and 49 points in 45 games for the Pride between 2002 and 2004 before missing his senior campaign due to injury. Springfield went 37–15 in his three years of action while making a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances. In 2001, Endicott was a U.S. Lacrosse High School All-American.
